

Foreword



Strengthening Insight Through Better Tools and Better Data




Alaska DOC Counts on July 1, 2025

The **Alaska Department of Corrections** is a **unified prison system**. This means the jail system (short-term holding, often pre-trial) is integrated into the prison system (long-term confinement, typically post-conviction). The Alaska Department of Corrections is responsible for **5 primary population groups** within the state: (1) Institutions, (2) probation & parole, (3) pretrial, (4) community residential centers (CRCs) and (5) electronic monitoring (EM) are all managed by DOC.

Offenders in **institutions** combined with those under **probation & parole** make up **79% of those in our care and custody**. With over


9,841

people in DOC custody, the combined DOC population is larger than the population of Sitka.



Offenders may be assigned to multiple categories (e.g. probation and EM), so for clarity, the graphic above only shows an offender in one category.


Institutions

Count and admissions data in this section includes information about all offenders under the jurisdiction of the State of Alaska who are entered into the Alaska Corrections Offender Management System (ACOMS). Count information consists of monthly averages and daily counts. Admissions data includes all criminal admits, non-criminal admits and federal holds for all offenders.

State of Alaska Constitution Article 1, §12


Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted. Criminal administration shall be based upon the following: the need for protecting the public, community condemnation of the offender, the rights of victims of crimes, restitution from the offender, and the principle of reformation.

Where Are Alaska Prisons Located?



Institution Population Over Fiscal Years




Due to Alaska's unified system, institutions houses both sentenced and unsentenced offenders, as well as federal offenders and a small number of **Title 47 holds** (Non-Criminal holds for individuals going through a mental health or substance abuse related crisis). There were **2** individuals under a Title 47 hold at the time of this count.



Most institutions house male and female offenders. On July 1, 2025, **9%** of offenders in institutions were female.





Admission Trends


Admissions are measured by the amount of unique bookings tracked by DOC each year.

Between 2019 and 2020, admissions dropped sharply, attributed largely to the COVID-19 pandemic; however, post-pandemic admissions have been relatively steady year over year. 2025 had the lowest admission count in the last 7 years.





Facility Populations

Goose Creek Correctional Center, located in Point Mackenzie, is Alaska's largest facility, housing over **25 times** more offenders than Alaska's smallest facility, Ketchikan Correctional Center; and more than **Alaska's 3rd and 4th largest facilities combined**.




Legal Status and Length of Stay

Those under supervision are represented by a specific legal status. **Inmate** is for those who are currently serving for convicted offense(s). **Unsentenced** are those awaiting sentencing for a charge; they may already be convicted of another charge. **Federal** are inmates who are exclusively serving charges from the Federal Government.

In addition, DOC also provides **Non-Criminal Title 47 holds** to those going through a mental health or substance abuse related crisis, there were **2** of these individuals under supervision on **July 1, 2025**.


Unsentenced status has fallen at a steady rate over the past three years as the COVID-19 court backlog is reduced.

Legal Status Over Time




Non-Criminal admissions have steeply declined over the past decade. Under **Title 47, substance-related holds** are capped at **48 hours** unless voluntarily extended, and **mental-health holds** are capped at **72 hours** unless extended by court order.

Non-Criminal Admissions




Short term and long term stays make up the vast majority of incarcerations. This is consistent with previous year demographics.

Length of Stay Distribution




Prison Population By Legal Status




The Average Age of Alaska's Inmate

Population Is Increasing. Over the past five years, the number of inmates **aged 29** and under has steadily declined. In contrast, the **40–49** and **59+** age groups have experienced consistent growth during the same period. A notable exception to this trend is the **30–39** age group, which nearly doubled from 2008 to 2022, but has declined over the past three years.

Prison Population By Race


Since 2021, Alaska Natives have comprised the largest share of the state's incarcerated population. This group began increasing in 2017 and peaked in 2022 before beginning a modest decline. The **White** inmate population—historically the largest demographic group—has shown a similar trend line to Alaska Natives, declining sharply since 2015, but in contrast, never rebounding to its previous population post decline. In the past decade, Alaska Natives made up roughly the same number of incarcerated inmates, while the number of White incarcerated inmates has dramatically decreased. The representation of other racial groups has remained relatively stable over the same period.

July 1, 2025


Number of Offenses by Crime Degree

Community Residential Centers and Electronic Monitoring


The Alaska Department of Corrections is committed to a proactive reentry process that supports individuals transitioning out of incarceration by providing them with the tools needed to be productive, healthy, and contributing members of communities across the state.

This section of the Offender Profile includes information about all offenders incarcerated in Community Residential Centers (CRCs) and four residential treatment centers, The Akeela House, Clitheroe Center, Phillips Ayagnirvik Treatment Center, and Alaska Addiction Rehabilitation Center. It also includes data on those under electronic monitoring (EM) who are entered into the ACOMS database.


CRC services in Alaska are provided through relatively open facilities located in neighborhoods and rely heavily on community resources to provide most of the services required by offenders. Community residential centers must provide offender detention and/or supervision on behalf of the DOC; flexibility in programs which are oriented to the specific needs of each individual in residence; and assistance with all aspects of community transition including employment, housing, and counseling services.

The largest age group in community residential centers was **30-39 (39.0%)**.




On July 1, 2025, the community residential centers had **10%** female offenders compared to **9%** in institutions.





The two largest racial groups in community residential centers were **Alaska Native (45.8%)** and **White (39.5%)**, together accounting for **85.3%** of the total CRC population.




Electronic Monitoring at a Glance

On July 1, 2025, in the electronic monitoring program the largest age group was **40-49 (34.2%)**.




On July 1, 2025, the electronic-monitoring program had **16.0%** female offenders compared to **9%** in institutions.

The two largest racial groups were **White (59.7%)** and **Alaska Native (21.7%)**, together representing **81.4%** of the EM population.




Pretrial, Probation & Parole

The Alaska Department of Corrections, Division of Pretrial, Probation & Parole, strives to help provide positive change in every town, village, and neighborhood in Alaska by enhancing public safety, assisting the court with the fair administration of justice for victims and defendants, and by providing quality supervision that holds defendants accountable, while connecting them to community partners and resources that can provide the tools for long-term change and success.


This section includes information about all pretrial defendants, probationers, and parolees under the supervision of Pretrial, Probation & Parole Services who are entered into the ACOMS database. It consists of a snapshot of pretrial defendants, probationers, and parolees entered into the ACOMS database on or before July 1, 2025. The Alaska Native race category includes a small number of Native Americans not indigenous to Alaska.

On July 1, 2025, the largest pretrial age group was **30-39** (34.4% of the total pretrial population).




On July 1, 2025, the pretrial program had **24.2%** female offenders and **75.8%** male offenders.





Probation & Parole Population Over Fiscal Years




On July 1, 2025, the Probation & Parole program had **17.9%** female offenders and **82.0%** male offenders.



On July 1, 2025, the largest Probation & Parole age group was **30-39** (**34.3%** of the total population).



The two largest racial groups in the Probation & Parole population were **White** (**44.6%**) and **Alaska Native** (**38.0%**), together representing **82.6%** of the total population.



Recidivism

Recidivism, defined as the recurrence of criminal behavior following release, is analyzed in this report using data from the Alaska Corrections Offender Management System (ACOMS).

To ensure consistency, the report relies on the Department's prior definition of recidivism, which encompasses the re-incarceration of convicted felons within three years of release as a result of a new sentence, including parole or probation adjudications.



Since the start of reporting this metric in 2013, Alaska has seen a clear long-term decline in recidivism among individuals releasing from felony sentences. While FY21 (54.59%) and FY22 (55.70%) show a small increase from FY20's unusually low rate—a year shaped by COVID-related conditions and temporary federal supports—the broader trend over the past decade remains downward. These year-to-year shifts are expected and should not be viewed as a reversal of progress.

Alaska DOC tracks recidivism to understand how well rehabilitation opportunities offered while incarcerated along with reentry programs and Probation & Parole supervision support successful transitions back into the community. Lower recidivism contributes to safer neighborhoods, reduced crime, more effective use of public funds, and it reflects the Department's ongoing efforts to improve outcomes for those leaving custody.


It is also important to note that recidivism cannot be reliably compared across states. The Council of State Governments Justice Center explains that "each state defines reincarceration slightly differently across three dimensions: (1) who is included, (2) length of follow-up period, and (3) type of reincarceration event that is included. Recidivism rates should not be compared across states."¹ **Alaska's unified prison and jail system further distinguishes it from most states.** For this reason, Alaska DOC focuses on consistent, transparent measurement within Alaska and continues to prioritize evidence-based programming, strong community partnerships, and practices that support safer communities statewide.


Recidivism By Race

The fiscal year 2022 releases cohort recidivism analysis reveals that **Alaska Native** experienced the highest recidivism rate (**62.06%**) while **Hispanic** had the lowest (**38.24%**). In terms of contribution to total recidivism, **Alaska Native** accounted for **48.52%** of all recidivated cases.

Proportion of Total Recidivism by Race (FY2022)




DNA Collection

Collecting DNA from convicted offenders is a trusted and effective tool that helps protect communities, solve crimes, and uphold justice with fairness and accuracy. For nearly three decades, the State of Alaska has built a robust DNA database, collecting thousands of samples to support public safety and serve the broader public interest.

In 2021, renewed commitment from state leadership elevated the prioritization of DNA collection, ensuring consistent collection for all eligible offenses. These efforts reflect Alaska's ongoing dedication to using science and technology to strengthen our justice system and keep our communities safe.

(July 1 - June 30)




DNA at a Glance

DNA is collected for each arrest with an offense that requires DNA collection. If a person is arrested for multiple cases, each with DNA eligible offenses, one DNA swab can be used against all of those cases. DNA would be collected from that person again should they be arrested in the future for another DNA qualifying offense. Because of this, DNA can be collected from the same individual multiple times in one year. In FY2025, 2 individuals had their DNA collected for 8 separate arrests.



In recent years, the State of Alaska has implemented targeted operational improvements to increase DNA collection rates for individuals arrested for sexual offenses. These efforts emphasize standardized intake procedures, statutory compliance, and timely collection of required DNA samples.
